HLPAS and Housing & Debt Tenders in 11 Designated Areas

On 11 April the LAA launched a further tender for contracts to deliver HLPAS and mainstream Housing & Debt contract work in 11 scheme areas. This follows two previous unsuccessful tender rounds which received no compliant bids in those areas.



HLPAS contract work will allow providers to deliver early legal advice in social welfare law alongside the in-court duty scheme (previously HPCDS). The HLPAS tender is the opportunity to deliver this new service.

The deadline for submitting tenders for this procurement process is **12pm on 28 April 2023.**

Applicants who have already tendered to deliver HLPAS Contract Work do not need to tender through this procurement process unless they wish to bid to deliver HLPAS, and, where relevant, Housing and Debt Contract Work in the areas covered by this procurement process.

HPCDS Fee Changes

The LAA has emailed us to announce that they are extending the provisions in the contract that allow providers to claim for two clients where there has been a nil-session and to claim the HPCDS fee in addition to a Legal Help fee where a case moves on to Legal Help. These changes were due to end on 30th April 2023 and have been extended to 31st August 2023.

The amended paragraphs are 10.20 and 10.24.

Civil Legal Aid Means Testing Calculator

There is a recent release updating information on how to work out financial eligibility for legal aid: income and capital means testing, passporting and the civil legal aid calculator.

New Civil Eligibility Calculator Tool

The LAA has published news on progress of the new online civil financial eligibility calculator. The news item notes that 'the working name for the new tool is 'Check if your client qualifies for legal aid' (CCQ). It is designed to be used when providing civil legal representation or advice to people with legal problems'.

The Secret Barrister lets rip on Twitter

The Secret Barrister published an excoriating Tweet in response to the Labour party's poster attacking Sunak on sentencing – that poster has attracted a lot of controversy especially for its perceived inaccuracies. For a Guardian article with more information, <u>see here</u>.

"Rishi Sunak believes that the criminal justice system is not a priority. He believes that it can be run by his incompetent mates on bargain basement rates. He believes that the fact it takes victims of serious sexual violence the best part of a decade to have their trial, does not demand urgent action. He believes in his Justice Secretary's plans to maintain a record backlog in the courts - despite his own MPs being among those condemning Raab's "meagre" efforts. He believes that a system where serious trials are cancelled every single day due to a chronic shortage of courts (because they've been sold off), judges (because they haven't been recruited) and criminal lawyers (because they've been forced out) does not need any more courts, judges or lawyers. He believes that it is acceptable for victims, witnesses, defendants and jurors to spend



days <u>shivering</u> in <u>collapsing</u>, <u>leaking</u> courts where <u>broken toilets spew sewage</u> and there is <u>nowhere to get a glass of water</u>. He believes that addressing the epidemic of <u>overcrowding</u>, <u>violence</u>, <u>self-harm and mental</u> <u>ill health</u> in our prisons is less important than <u>putting even more people into those</u> <u>conditions</u>. He believes that the measure of success is <u>how long those people remain there</u>, rather than whether the public is any safer upon their release.

He believes that if you are wrongly accused of a crime, you shouldn't be able to recoup your legal fees – meaning you could be **bankrupted for the crime of being innocent**. And if you are wrongly convicted and spend years of your life in prison, Rishi Sunak does not believe that **you should be compensated**."

Digital Developments in Applying for Criminal Legal Aid

Following a meeting of the Crime Contract Consultative Group the LAA has sent out this information to share with members.

The LAA's current service contract for eForm applications ends in 2024. A new digital replacement service is being developed.

The new Criminal legal aid application service will replace the CRM 14 and 15 parts of the eForms service. Testing with a small group of providers and caseworkers will begin in summer 2023 on an early version of the service, which will cover new applications by defendants with:

- A National Insurance Number, unless aged under 18
- A passported benefit, including Universal Credit
- No partner

We plan to gradually sign up more providers as users while the service is being developed. Firms will be contacted to confirm when they can be brought on board.

It is expected that there will be a fully functional replacement for CRM 14s and 15s by early 2024.

<u>The gov.uk article</u> gives more detail. Members of the project team met representative bodies on 4 April and gave an overview of plans and demonstrated an early version of the service. The LAA welcome feedback on this development and would particularly like views on

how best they can keep providers updated on progress.

Common platform

The <u>Common Platform digital case management</u> <u>system</u> is now in use in Bournemouth Crown Court, Poole Magistrates' Court and Weymouth Magistrates' Court. We flag this up because it reminded us that at a recent meeting with the Shadow Lord Chancellor he was aware of concerns about the system. DSCC

At the most recent Crime Contract Consultative Group we were given a presentation about the DSCC covering performance, complaints and customer satisfaction entitled **Performance Update, February 2023**.

DSCC performance is considered 'green' and meeting Service Level Agreements, with one exception:

- 80.49% of calls answered within 30 seconds
 exceeding target (80%)
- Average speed to answer 27 seconds or less – exceeding target (30 seconds)
- 94.84% calls answered by live operator not meeting target (95%)
- 97.65% cases deployed within 5 minutes exceeding target (95%)
- 99.37% cases deployed within 15 minutes exceeding target (99%)

Funding Gap in the Advice Sector – CJF report

The Community Justice Fund recently published its Funding Gap Report on the Free Legal Advice Sector 2023-24. This report and figures are based on conversation with Community Justice Fund grantees and are meant to give a broad indication of the issues faced by advice services at the frontline.

The report gives voice to frontline experiences demonstrating that the free legal advice sector is facing a £30million funding gap with over 40,000 people who are most impacted by the cost of living crisis potentially going without the advice and assistance they need.

In addition to strengthening their understanding about the increased impact that the cost of living crisis is having on advice organisations, the report also highlights their key learning around the relationship between long-term core costs funding and addressing the workforce wellbeing and retention issues facing the frontline.
