# **Civil Legal Aid News**

### Immigration Providers South West Support Directory

Last week, we reported that the LAA had written to all Immigration & Asylum legal aid providers offering the opportunity to be part of a list of providers who can take on cases from the South West of England where clients have been unable to instruct a provider in that procurement area. The list, or rather the Immigration Providers South West Support Directory, is up on the LAA website <u>here</u>.

We also reported that the Immigration Law Practitioners Association (ILPA) had asked the LAA to provide further information on how this scheme is supposed to work in practice. The LAA has now responded to a number of questions. Questions from ILPA and answers from the LAA (in italics) are below:

- What cases will these providers who indicate their availability be permitted to accept? Any cases that are permitted under the Immigration and Asylum contract.
- Must these cases first be offered to providers in the South West, and only if individuals have not been able to instruct a



provider in the South West will individuals be referred to providers on the list? *Yes* 

- If the providers outside of the South West take the less loss-making or non-loss-making South West cases, what viable work is left for the providers remaining in the South West? Individuals in the South West should first contact a provider in the South West who can then say whether they are able to assist that individual. If they are not then the individual should be referred to the list
- What consideration has been given to the impact of these proposals on those remaining providers? One member has said, 'If the work is not restricted, it increases pressure on us to close and lose all capacity in the SW. Individuals in the South West should first contact a provider in the South West who can then say whether they are able to assist that individual. If they are not then the individual should be referred to the list. This is intended to be in place only if providers in the South West are not able to assist individuals. This is being done in light of feedback that individuals in the South West are not able to find a provider to take on their case.
- Were providers in the South West consulted before this decision was taken? If not, why not? This is not the first time we have operated such a list, a list operated from April 2022 to June 2023. If providers in the South West can assist an individual then they will not need to be referred to the list.
- Was any consideration given to better funding providers in the South West, so that they can increase capacity in the area? The Review of Civil Legal Aid (ROCLA) is looking at the sustainability of the civil legal aid market.
- I also wonder if you are asking providers to indicate their ability and willingness to provide legal services face-to-face? The advice can be remote.
- I appreciate 'The advice can be remote'. However, in relation to the last question, I am still wondering if in relation to the list, you are specifically ascertaining capacity and willingness to provide face-to-face rather than remote advice? We are ascertaining willingness and ability to deliver remote advice.

In our view the need to operate a system like this, whereby vulnerable clients are required to try to access remote services because of a lack of capacity for local services, is yet another clear indication of system failure. This is an issue that must be directly addressed by the MOJ through RoCLA by improving payment rates across the legal aid scheme. Nothing else will ensure that providers can recruit, retain and support the staff required to deliver quality-assured services in their local area.

### <u>Changes to the general specification - remote</u> <u>supervision</u>

The LAA has made changes to the 2018 Standard Civil Contract General Specification to allow remote supervision. There are changes to paragraphs 2.21 and 2.23 of the General Specification. The provisions to allow remote supervision are in line with the 2022 Standard Crime Contract and the 2024 Standard Civil Contract.

Paragraph 2.21 has been amended to remove the requirement for a supervisor to designate at least one day per calendar month to be physically in attendance at each office where they supervise staff and on a day that coincides with the staff being present. Paragraph 2.23 has been amended to provide more flexibility over how supervision is conducted (whether face-to-face or remotely) and allows the provider to make that decision as they see fit.

### **RoCLA Advocacy Research**

The Ministry of Justice has commissioned IFF Research, an independent social research agency, to carry out research into the civil legal aid advocacy system as part of the MoJ's <u>Review of</u> <u>Civil Legal Aid</u> (RoCLA). This aims to collect evidence on the role of advocates, the incentives to work on legal aid and perceptions of advocates in the system from both advocates and instructing solicitors.

IFF Research are inviting **barrister advocates**, **non-barrister advocates and instructing solicitors** to a one-to-one research discussion in November or early December. To achieve a good understanding of perspectives and build a fuller picture of the legal aid advocacy system, they are looking to speak with legal professionals with varying levels of experience and from across law categories, employer type and across England and Wales.

<u>The information sheet attached</u> outlines the research context, how participants can contribute, interview details and how to contact the IFF Research team.

# Fee increase announced for pre-recorded evidence

On 25 October 2023 the MoJ announced a '[b]arrister fee increase to help vulnerable victims bring attackers to justice'. You can read the press release here.
