We have begun work to consider the issues relating to longer-term sustainability of the civil and family legal aid system.


We're looking at a number of areas:

## What we've learned

In 2020, we held a series of workshops on civil sustainability more generally with the representative bodies and providers the representative bodies and the LAA have put forward, which identified the following key concerns for the sector:
