Criminal Legal Aid – Latest

Update Following Government Laying Fees S.I.

If you are a crime practitioner you will no doubt be concerned at the gap between what the government announces on fees and the reality of what those increases (if any) actually are.

On 20 July a Statutory Instrument was laid: https://www.gov.uk/government/news/significan t-fee-rise-for-criminal-barristers-confirmed-inlaw

The government press release summary was:

- legislation laid to increase barrister fees by 15 percent from the end of September 2022
- the typical criminal barrister will receive £7,000 extra a year
- fifteen percent increase for solicitors' work in magistrates' courts and police stations

The Law Society, in their press release the same day, pointed out that for solicitors this is still a 9% increase not the 15% rise that the Criminal Legal Aid Independent Review said was 'the bare minimum required'. The Law Society is calling this a make-or-break time for the criminal defence profession and the criminal justice system.

LAPG was pleased to note that The Law Society's press release emphasised the lack of any proposed increases for prison law work – ignoring the recommendation in CLAIR for a 15% rise.

As in the government response, there is no increase in the LGFS because the government want to overhaul the scheme. It does seem that reform of the LGFS is high on the agenda but the fear is that this could take some time and practitioner groups are meeting to discuss what steps could be taken.

For a summary of the problems see <u>the LCCSA</u> <u>letter to the Lord Chancellor</u> which predates the S.I.

Also predating the S.I. <u>is the CLSA call</u> for an across the board increase of 15% but it is still relevant despite being published on 1 July. As the S.I. does not address the urgent need for increases in all fees, criminal defence practitioners that we are in contact with remain livid at being let down and livid at the misrepresentation of the

So still everything to play for in terms of the Criminal Legal Aid Review and resulting policy proposals from the MOJ. And what, if anything, will change with a potential Ministerial reshuffle come September? (Aside: While I can't bring myself to follow the leadership election too closely, I have noticed a near complete absence of discourse or traditional Conservative rhetoric about justice or the rule of law). We know that civil practitioners are also watching the CLAR process closely, and not just because around 400 provider organisations still cover both civil and criminal legal aid. Also watch this space for a MOJ announcement in the autumn about a formal review of civil legal aid sustainability. If the criminal review is anything to go by, civil practitioners will not be feeling particularly optimistic about the outcome of a civil review, but we and other representative bodies will continue to press hard for significant fee increases and bureaucratic reform. We are also working hard behind the

scenes to build understanding across the political sphere of the importance of legal aid and the need for investment. And meanwhile, there is an ongoing and crucial role for us to play, with your support as our members, to improve the existing scheme, resolve your queries and respond to government consultations. I thought August was supposed to be a relatively quiet month...?
